CCS has learned - over 30 years of providing support and care - that people who have experienced homelessness need



more than just shelter; they need support to adapt, move forward, and find skills and confidence that can help them towards recovery, community connection, well-being and independence.

The Lifeskills for Community Connection program creates new

mechanisms for clients to access learning and life skills that will lead to their longer-term well-being, recovery and development.

Events included special meals to clients at Newcastle Place and Orca Place to honour the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation (see photo above), sandwich making for clients and a West Coast High Tea.
